

The Portico Library is a subscription-based independent library, founded in 1806, with a primarily 19th century stock.

The following is an annotated bibliography of selected works at the Portico concerning the country of Italy, its history and culture. It is intended for anyone interested in Italy and wishing to gain an understanding of life in the country from a variety of perspectives in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries.

For ease of reference, the works are divided by subject into the following categories:

- Famous Italians
- Italian History and Politics
- Italian Art, Painting and Sculpture
- Italian Literature: both Italian works and those about Italy or Italians
- Italian Poetry and Poets
- Travels in Italy

Works are listed alphabetically by author within each category. Please ask a member of library staff to help you locate books and make a note of the class mark in bold at the bottom of each entry (e.g. Mc 124) so that they can be found quickly.

Although the subject of this booklist is Italy, there are in fact very few materials in the Portico that are written in Italian. Many have been translated, either by the original author or by others, and there are some modern books in Italian, but the only book from the original collection that remains in the Italian language is *Storia della letteratura italiana*, an 11-volume history of Italian literature published in 1787.

By far the most common theme found in the Portico's Italian collection is that of travels in the country. A large percentage of this booklist is concerned with those writers who completed a "Grand Tour" to Italy and surrounding European countries; visiting landmarks, experiencing culture, and recording their experiences both in words and in illustrations. This early form of narrative travel writing often focuses on particular Italian cities, the most popular being Rome, Florence, Venice and Naples. The prevalence of this type of writing reflects the popularity of the Grand Tour tradition in eighteenth and nineteenth centuries, which was obviously of great interest to the founders of the Portico upon its opening in 1806. As well as these travel journals, there are also a number of more recognisable "travel guides" which

are published by a company rather than an individual, and offer guidance and recommendations to those wishing to travel to Italy.

Another notable subject is that of Italy's political revolution and reunification from a collection of independent states into a united country. This took place in the mid-nineteenth century and was accompanied by great unrest, violence, and political and social change. The books at the Portico provide a wide range of information about this period, from biographies of military leaders such as Giuseppe Garibaldi, to historical descriptions of the warring states and political uprisings, to personal accounts of violence and brigandage from travellers. It is evident that reunification and the surrounding conflicts were a prevalent concern for both Italians and those who visited the country at this time.
